Year 10 and Year 11 (also known as Key Stage 4) are when you will complete your GCSE Qualifications.

At Key Stage 4 you will build on the knowledge, skills and understanding you have developed so far on your learning journey, and study towards achieving formal qualifications that will have an impact on the steps you are able to take after you have turned 16. This could be in education, training, or even employment.

Choosing Options is an exciting (and potentially a daunting) time, as it is the first time you have some **element of control** over the subjects that you study.




All students will study qualifications in English, mathematics and science, as these are the subjects that provide the foundations for life.

Most further learning opportunities at post-16 will consider results in at least 5 qualifications, including the three core subjects. Employers will also look at these exam results as a benchmark for recruitment, so success in core subjects provides a strong grounding for access into the job market.

Core subjects are not just valued by schools, colleges, universities and the workplace, core subjects are also an integral part of our daily life. If you are able to equip yourself with the skills to understand the foundations of English, maths and science, you will have the tools to become a confident individual, up for a challenge, able to problem solve and ultimately able to make informed choices about your future.

In short, the more credible the grades you can achieve in these critical subjects, the more opportunities will be open to you when the time comes to make decisions about your future.



Open Choice Subjects give you the opportunity to continue your studies in areas that you choose.

There are a wide range of subjects for you to choose from; some of them will be subjects that you haven't studied before, for example Business Studies, Construction, Photography or Sociology, whilst others will be more familiar to you, such as Art, Drama, Graphics, Music, PE or Textiles, as well as Geography, History and Languages.

Your Open Choice will give you opportunity to select subjects that interest you or that you enjoy, subjects that you feel you are good at, or subjects which link into areas you would like to study beyond 16, or pursue a career in, at some point in the future.




Through your Guided Choice Subjects we ensure that the profile of qualifications you leave us with opens up the best possible opportunities for you.

Guided Choice Subjects are academic (theory-based rather than practical) qualifications, and ones which are recognised as part of the 'English Baccalaureate'.

The English Baccalaureate (although not a qualification in itself) is a measure of success in core and academic subjects. These are subjects most likely to be required or preferred for entry to degree courses and ones that will keep the most doors open for you.

Even if you're not thinking about following a university pathway now, these qualifications will still provide you with knowledge and skills that will stand you in good stead for the future.



The qualifications you achieve will only provide opportunities for you if you are able to demonstrate that you have the understanding, personal attributes and attitude that means you can contribute effectively to society and the World around you.

This includes the ability to manage risk and keep yourself safe, understanding how to lead a healthy lifestyle and manage your own mental health and wellbeing, appreciating diversity and valuing equality of opportunity for all, as well as understanding your own worth.

Mentor time and the assembly program will be complemented by taught lessons in RCS (Religious and Citizenship Studies which includes Personal, Social and Health Education) and PE, which will form the 'unexamined' elements of your timetable.

Science Options





- 2 x GCSEs
- 6 x exams (1h 15min)
- 10 lessons per fortnight
- Rotations of Biology, Chemistry
 & Physics (Approximately 25 lessons each)

Separate (Triple)

- 3 x GCSEs
- 6 x exams (1h 45min)
- 15 / 16 lessons per fortnight
- Linear or rotations of Biology, Chemistry & Physics lessons (25 lessons + option lessons)

Separate Sciences - Triple Award

Course Content

Same base Biology, Chemistry & Physics content as combined science but with some topics extended Increased examination length

Higher Level Material

Each topic covered in standard science lessons covered at an extended and deeper level

Developed Mathematics

Increased mathematical content, particularly in Physics

Extended Skills
